The Richard E. and Anna Lee Hamilton Series on Theology and Contemporary Issues

The Richard E. and Anna Lee Hamilton Series on Theology and Contemporary Issues was established in 2018 with a gift from the William E. Schmidt Foundation. It honors the lives and ministries of Dick and Anna Lee Hamilton at North United Methodist Church in Indianapolis, Indiana. Dick served as the Senior Pastor at North from 1974 - 1997 and was known for his work in the city and state on issues of social justice and Christian action. Anna Lee was a talented partner in ministry, adding her singing, teaching and leadership skills to the church and wider community.

The Hamilton Series brings speakers, seminars and special musical events to North on various issues. The theme for 2022 is "Creation Care and Stewardship for the Earth." For the May 22 event, the Series has commissioned two anthems being premiered in the worship services today. On October 8-9 two additional anthems will be presented, along with a special guest speaker and various workshops.

Additional support for the Hamilton Series is provided by Nick and Susan Blankenbaker Noyes and the Blankenbaker family, as well as gifts from individuals in memory of Dick and Anna Lee. North UMC and the Hamilton family are very grateful for these generous gifts.



The award-winning music of Michael Bussewitz-Quarm engages singers and audiences through the soulful exploration of social and environmental themes around the world. Michael is passionate about effecting change through choral music, addressing topics ranging from art in post-civil war Raleigh-Durham, to gun violence, to the global refugee crisis. A centerpiece of each commissioning consortium is the opportunity to work with Bussewitz-Quarm virtually and through pre-recorded panel discussions with artists, authors, and thought leaders in the area of focus.

Additionally she offers an extensive catalog of existing work through self-publication (www.listenafresh.com) and Peermusic Classical. Bussewitz-Quarm won The American Prize in Composition (major works) in 2021 and will make her Carnegie Hall debut in 2023 featuring her work, *Where We Find Ourselves*.

Greg Gilpin is a well-known ASCAP award-winning choral composer and arranger and a highly respected choral conductor throughout the United States and internationally, including the respected and historic venues of Carnegie Hall and Lincoln Center in New York City; Sydney Opera House in Sydney, Australia; Ryman Auditorium in Nashville; Royal Festival Hall in London and Harpa Concert Hall in Reykjavik, Iceland. In addition he works as a producer and musician in the recording industry and is Director of Educational Choral Publications for Shawnee Press, a distinguished choral publisher.



In 2020 Gilpin's pandemic pivot took him on an additional career path by becoming certified as a financial coach as well as a certified Boss Organizer, creating his own professional organizing business, Maestro Organizing. This work has led him to be seen on FOX and NBC affiliates as well as his association with Dorothy Breininger, wellknown for her work as producer and organizer on the hit TV show Hoarders. He can currently be seen working on several episodes of this TV show. In 2021 Gilpin wrote the score for the award-winning short film Rosie's Rescue and also won an award for Best Score for this same work. He also teamed up with well-known opera singer Angela Brown and created the world premiere of a thrilling new arrangement of *What Child is This?*, debuted by Brown and the Indianapolis Symphonic Choir.



With the 2022 theme Creation Care and Stewardship for the Earth, the Cathedral Singers will perform two new choral anthems: *Go Out in Joy!* by Michael Bussewitz-Quarm of Long Island and *Sing for the Earth* by Greg Gilpin of Indianapolis.

Timothy Eberhart is the Robert and Marilyn Degler McClean Associate Professor of Ecological Theology and Practice and Director of the Center for Ecological Regeneration. He received his B.A. from St. Olaf College and his M.Div., Ph.D. from Vanderbilt University.
